Because we recognize the acute need for food that so many in our region currently have, this year we are contributing \$2,000 each to the following organizations: Foodshare, which in recent weeks has operated a drive-thru food distribution center at Rentschler Field; Jewish Family Services of Greater Hartford, which provides community support to help people of all religions; and Hands on Hartford, founded in 1969 as Center City Churches, a social service nonprofit organization that serves Hartford's neediest residents in the areas of food, housing and health.

Thank you to Linda Busch for organizing KC's donation to **Hands On Hartford Soup Kitchen.** Linda delivered 12 pans of baked ziti, salad, rolls and 106 pounds of non perishables (cans, dry goods, peanut butter, pasta, sauce, cereal, potatoes, etc.).

We'll probably do it again on either 5/18 or 6/1.



Elaine Groundwater's Passover Seder lite! Matzo ball soup and Charoseth - comfort foods - all is good!









QUITE A COMMUNITY

This winter, we had almost no snow after December. Somehow, in January, I managed to slip on black ice on my own driveway. The fall broke my wrist. Luckily the Urgent Care office at Bishop's Corner was already open at 9:00 a.m. that Sunday. They took x-rays and created a temporary cast. A few days later, I developed severe abdominal pain. For the next month I underwent tests and more tests. None of the half dozen doctors involved could figure out what was going on.

Some days I felt well enough to drive myself to medical appointments. Other days, not. When I needed to go the Emergency Room, I called Mary Williams. She recruited Faith Fuerst to drive me to John Dempsey Hospital. Faith sat in my ER cubicle for six hours. At 6:00 p.m. I looked up and saw Rafie Podolsky. Apparently, Mary had recruited him, too.

Rafie stayed until 10:30 and came back at midnight when I was finally discharged. He drove me home. Charlotte Gara drove me to some doctors' appointments. Emma Prokopets called to see how I was doing, then chatted cheerfully. Debby Szajnberg kept in touch every few days offering help from Membership Support.

Eventually, an endoscopy revealed that the little bit of Advil (boo, hiss!), prescribed to relieve swelling from the broken wrist, had caused an ulcer which caused the pain.

When I called a friend in California to let her know of my experience, her comment was, "It sounds like you have quite a community there." Yes – and thank you everyone! Dear Beloved Fellow Members of Kehilat Chaverim,

I am writing to thank you for your kindness to my family as some of you learned of my terrible suffering over the past several weeks. The various ways in which you reached out to Jane--as I was incommunicado under the throes of the illness--and the gift you sent are appreciated. What our family has always loved about Kehilat Chaverim is your understanding of the ethical dimensions to which we should all be committed not only as Jews but also, simply, as human beings.

I have been doing better for eight days now (stabilized temperatures and excellent oxygen levels), which is why I am writing this note at this time. I did not want to offer, as we say, misleading information from writing early. My plan is to act under the assumption of being ill for another month since there is always danger of relapse, as this is a wily virus and its newness offers too much unpredictability.

I learned a lot about its ability to tailor itself to one's vulnerabilities. Should any of you like to contact me for some of what I learned, please feel free to do so. As is obvious, many in our community are especially vulnerable.

Finally, it's a relief not to hear ambulance sirens. Still, Jane and I--as I'm sure many of you--have lost people to COVID-19. The trauma of sirens continue in NYC, Detroit, and so many places across the country and the globe. We have lit candles for those who have become ancestors, and I think every moment of those still suffering from severe symptoms of this plague.

We learn, however, to appreciate our blessings. Jane and I have, among them, our wisdom of having joined Kehilat Chaverim when we moved to West Hartford.

Wishes of safety, good health, and, in the midst of this pandemic, even moments of joy to each of you. We should never forget to value living life.
